GGG and City Manager Meet Over Police Hiring

A letter generated by the Gables Good Government Committee (GGG) to Coral Gables City Manager Cathy Swanson-Rivenbark

(April 29, 2016) regarding the apparent delay in the hiring of some 20 new sworn Police Officers, became the catalyst for a meeting between the City Manager and GGG. President Debbie Swain and GGG Board Members

Susi Davis and Juan Carlos Diaz-Padron met with Ms. Swanson-Rivenbark on June 21, 2016.

In a nearly two-hour meeting, City Manager Swanson-Rivenbark gave a detailed explanation of the hiring process for the Coral Gables Police Department, which has a goal of hiring nine new officers by the end of 2016. (This number is substantially lower than the needed number of new officer hires shown on the home page of the Coral Gables Fraternal Order of Police website.) The City Manager gave a comprehensive overview of the

City and Police Department's outreach recruitment strategy, the stringent qualifications required of officer candidates, the extensive

> background investigations made on final candidates, and the various training programs required for an inexperienced hire versus an experienced hire. Newly hired officers do not serve the community immediately as they must attend Po-

lice Academy training of various lengths of time based on prior experience.

GGG's questions targeted several areas. The City Manager was asked about the recent lack of available police officers to work private events for Coral Gables residents. Ms. Swanson-Rivenbark did confirm that there has been a shortage of officers available for this service on occasion, but believes it will be remedied with the hiring of new officers.

Another question focused on over-time pay. GGG had determined that the annual allocation for over-time pay had been exhausted in the first six months of 2016. The City Manger's solution as to how this short fall will be covered involved the transfer of funds from other areas of the Police Department budget.

Additional concerns for Coral Gables residents such as low staffing of marine patrol, bike patrol and motormen units were mentioned. The City Manager stated that these units were currently adequately staffed and that additional layers of public safety protection are being provided by two new initiatives, the Neighborhood Team Policing and Neighborhood Safety Aides and the new Crime Intelligence Center.

The new Neighborhood Safety Aides program will be operated by uniformed civilians and will be supporting the zone officer and Neighborhood Team Policing leader. This is a new layered approach to policing im-

plemented by the City administration. Aides will be driving electric GEM cars with an amber strobe light, continuously patrolling an individual neighborhood zone. The Neighborhood Safety Aides will be trained in CPR and First Aid. They will also perform crime




-prevention functions, such as hiding home package deliveries that may be visible from the street. While vehicles have been purchased for the program and were parked in the Police Station at the time of this meeting, only one individual had been interviewed for an aide position and none had been hired.

At the conclusion of the meeting, City Manager Swanson-Rivenbark said she would be available to give GGG an update on the police hiring process whenever requested.

"Burger Bob's" Receives Coral Cube Award from the City



New Life in North Gables?

This tidy, little, eight unit, multi-family building, located at 114 Menores, could become one of the few Bed and Breakfast businesses in Coral Gables since the 1920's. It was designed by H. George Fink, prominent Coral Gables architect. According to the Historic Designation Report relevant to this structure, "The building appears to retain the majority of its original historic fabric including its original wood windows and doors." Additionally, new recommended changes in the zoning code, require that buildings used for bed and breakfast operations be designated as historic. It has been nearly 25 years since the zoning code was changed to allow bed & breakfast establishments in the North Gables area.
